NSUOCO Interprofessional Education with OSU-College of Medicine



Collaboration between health professions is extremely important and it is vital for optometry students to learn how to prepare for interprofessional communication. This September, our fourth year students were fortunate to have a collaboration lab day with the Oklahoma State University College of Medicine (OSU-COM) students. NSUOCO fourth year students, residents, and Dr. Carolyn Majcher and Dr. April Parker met with the second year OSU-COM students to assist in their eye exam lab. The College of Optometrists in Vision Development welcomed 42 Fellows (FCOVD) of the College of Optometrists in Vision Development. The newly certified participated in a formal induction ceremony in conjunction with the 51st Annual Meeting of the College of Optometrists in Vision Development, April 5-9, in Columbus, Ohio. To become a Fellow (FCOVD), the doctor must have graduated from an Accreditation Council for Optometric Education (ACOE)-accredited institution; been in active clinical practice for at least three years, at least two of which have included the direct diagnosis and management of vision therapy patients; completed 100 hours of relevant CE or a relevant residency program; successfully completed the guided study portion of the process set forth by International Examination and Certification Board (IECB) which includes 3 case reports and 6 open book questions as prescribed by the Fellowship Candidate Guide; and successfully completed the oral and written examinations according to the established criteria of the IECB. 





Callie (Jordan) and Clyde Stinson Optometric Student Equipment Fund

On your road to becoming an optometrist, you undoubtedly overcame obstacles. The long hours of school, late night studying for exams, and of course the cost of tuition and equipment. You persevered and achieved a goal; something the late Callie (Jordan) Stinson knew plenty about. Born in 1910, Callie was rendered blind shortly after birth when a doctor administered improperly formulated eye drops. In spite of this, she thrived and achieved accomplishments that might have seemed impossible in a similar situation.

Callie was a fixture in the Tahlequah community, volunteering with the First United Methodist Church, organizing blood drives for the Red Cross and campaigning for Governor Nigh, amongst her other activities. She and her husband Clyde always gave back. Now her family strives to honor their memories by donating to another fixture of the Tahlequah community—Northeastern State University.

The family's ultimate goal is to provide equipment to all first-year optometry students at NSU free of charge, in perpetuity. Earlier this year, they established the Callie (Jordan) and Clyde Stinson Optometric Student Equipment Fund towards that goal. From now until June 2021, an anonymous donor will match your gift dollar for dollar up to \$25,000. Leslie Bennett Bell Optometry Scholarship Endowment

Leslie Bell was born in Independence, Missouri in 1956. After obtaining degrees in elementary and special education, Leslie found that she was a student more than a teacher. She then asked to join and learn the family business as a fourth generation member.

Leslie's great granddad, Robert Elmer Bennett, founded Bennett's Jewelry and Optical Incorporated in 1909, then earned his CD by a 6-month correspondence course. Granddad Howard Andy Bennett was a jeweler and watch maker. Leslie's dad, Howard Andy Jr., was a journeyman optician who managed two labs in Kansas City, Missouri, before joining the family business. Leslie's brother, David Scott Bennett, earned his Doctor of Optometry degree from University of Missouri - Saint Louis College of Optometry and grew the business into Bennett Eyecare Midwest LLC.

Leslie is proud of being a fourth-generation optician, but is no less proud of her two successful, caring children and her wonderful husband of 37 years, Ron Bell.

The final chapter and proud achievement in Leslie's life was working in the NSU Oklahoma College of Optometry (NSUOCO) Spectacle Fabrication Lab ("Spec Fab Lab"). With the much-appreciated tutelage of supervisor Larry Johnsey, in addition to co-worker Scott Brewer and Dr. Alan McKee, Leslie has passed the Master's in Opticianry exam. Working with the students and faculty at NSUOCO has been most gratifying and instructive. As Leslie says, "I love learning!" This scholarship was established by Leslie and Ron with that motto in mind, to allow others to continue their studies in optometry at NSUOCO.

Awarding of the Scholarship

Required Qualifications of the Scholars

This scholarship has been created to provide annual scholarship monies to one or more full-time students at Northeastern State University. Qualified applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be a student pursuing an OD at NSUOCO (may be any class year)
- Have financial need that is not met by family resources, tribal assistance, or governmental assistance such as Indian Health Services.
- Be passionate about learning

Application Process

This scholarship will be advertised by NSU's Scholarship Office. The application process will be managed by the NSU Oklahoma College of Optometry. The selection recommendation will be made by a committee composed of individuals selected by the Dean of the NSU Oklahoma College of Optometry.

Amount of the Scholarship

The actual dollar amount of each scholarship awarded will be determined by the Executive Director of the NSU Foundation after a review of the money available in this scholarship fund. One-half of the annual award will be made for the fall semester. The second half of the annual award will be made for the fall semester. The second half of the annual award will be made for the ensuing spring semester if the scholar maintains at least a 3.0 GPA (4.0 scale). The scholarship is a one-year award. Previous scholarship recipients may apply and receive the award in consecutive years.

NSUOCO Olga Hoenes Scholarship

NSUOCO is proud to announce the Olga Hoenes scholarship which has been started thanks to contributions from alumni. Olga was a long-time administrative assistant whose wonderful spirit, warmth, and generosity impacted decades of students, staff, and faculty at NSUOCO. Her legacy will remain at NSUOCO for years to come. Ataloa "Olga" Hoenes departed this life in June of 2020 at the age of 64.

Congratulations are in order for Dr. Michelle Welch, recently named the American Optometric Association's "Distinguished Service Award" winner. Dr. Welch won the award for "her unusually significant contributions to the profession of optometry," which we have all been lucky enough to witness first-hand. This is a wonderful recognition of Dr. Welch's skill and dedication to optometry, as well as a national acknowledgment of the wonderful work being done in Oklahoma.

She is is currently one of the staff optometrists for the Idabel Choctaw Nation Health Clinic. Prior to her start there in 2014, she worked at the Northeastern State University (NSU) College of Optometry for 19 years, serving as a professor, an associate dean, and the director of clinical care services. In addition to being a 1995 graduate of NSUOCO, she is a former

president of the Oklahoma Association of Optometric Physicians and a former member of several committees overseen by the Cherokee Nation governing standards of care in health care. She was honored with the NSU Circle of Excellence Award for Service in 2010 and was named the OAOP's Oklahoma Optometrist of the Year in 2013. She has taught dozens of continuing medical education courses that advance the profession of optometry and help to elevate the work of her colleagues.

Congratulations are also in order for OAOP member Dr. Denise Roddy, recently selected by the AOA Contact Lens and Cornea Section (CLCS) Council as the recipient of the 2021 Dr. Rodger Kame Award.

A 1988 graduate of NSUOCO, Dr. Roddy is an excellent choice, and her selection reflects well on the Oklahoma Optometry community.


