Dr. Preston Smith 5K Memorial Run



Thanks to a generous donation from the Nix Foundation, the NSUOCO Vision Therapy program received a cuttingedge, virtual-reality system, Vivid Vision, this summer. This hardware aids in the correction of amblyopia (lazy eye), strabismus (misalignment of eye) disorders, and accommodation (focusing) disorders. According to NSU Foundation Director, Peggy Glenn, "The Nix Foundation's continued passion for helping children and adults in northeastern Oklahoma with vision issues is greatly appreciated and will have a positive impact on the type of vision care available at the Oklahoma College of Optometry." The Nix Foundation is a charitable organization founded by the Nix family. Their interest in eye care and ocular health comes from the visual impairments caused by improperly administered eye drops after the birth of Mildred Jordan Nix and her twin, Callie Jordan Stinson, in 1910. The organization focuses on gifting resources to areas in health care, research, treatment, training and education scholarships to the communities in which they serve.

Expressing her excitement for the possibilities this equipment offers, NSUOCO Assistant Professor Dr. Sarah Krein states, "Having this Vivid Vision unit here at NSUOCO means our patients have access to the latest and most advanced amblyopia treatment system available. This equipment is providing a fun, virtual, interactive activity for patients, and it allows the doctors to have better control over the patient's experience during therapy. World Sight Day

Each year, NSUOCO holds fundraisers to help raise money and awareness for World Sight Day. World Sight Day is an annual day of awareness held on the second Thursday of October, this year falling on October 12. This day is dedicated to global attention on preventable blindness and vision impairment.

Celebrating this cause a week early to accommodate the Academy meeting in

Chicago, NSUOCO students, faculty, staff and community members participated in several fundraisers during the week of October 2-6. Kick-starting the week was the annual Bake Sale, displaying a tempting spread of sweet treats, all donations from the NSUOCO family.

T-Shirts were sold before the festivities began. All wore shirts purchased either this year or from previous years on Thursday, October 5. Later that evening was the week's fun and most challenging event: Dinner in the Dark.

During Dinner in the Dark, participants are blindfolded and then escorted to their seats in a dark room to eat their meal. Following the meal is a modified version of Braille Bingo, omitting Braille characters and using shapes and domino numbers instead. To increase the fun, generous local businesses donated products to be used as Bingo and door prizes, including gift certificates to El Molcajete, Buffalo Wild Wings, and Presley's Burgers and a pair of Silver Dollar City tickets.

A total of \$576.68 was raised and donated to the organization Our Children's Vision, an initiative to help children who are living without access to the eye care and glasses they need.

We plan to host similar events again next year, and anyone is welcome to attend Dinner in the Dark. SVOSH Team Travels to Roatán, Honduras



This summer, the NSUOCO SVOSH (Student Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity) chapter travelled to Roatán, Honduras to provide optometric services. The 'OCO chapter has been serving Roatán since 2009, going there every summer since 2011, usually in late July or early August. They are also currently working to add a second trip, possibly in December 2018.

SVOSH is a student chapter of VOSH International, and each chapter continually provides a specific location(s) with optometric services. Though NSUOCO's specific site is Roatán, SVOSH members are encouraged to join any other SVOSH or VOSH clinic trips to other locations (vosh. org). Members are also encouraged to participate in other service events, such as the Special Olympics, Bedlam clinic, and the Hispanic Health Fair. Currently, the NSUOCO SVOSH chapter has 51 members. There are 22 North American SVOSH Chapters and 24 other global chapters, totaling an estimated 2,000 SVOSH members internationally.

This past summer, a team of 19 travelled to Roatán, including 17 current NSUOCO students, faculty member Dr. Alissa Proctor (SVOSH advisor) and Dr. Phillip Ford, an NSUOCO alumnus ('15). Dr. Jamie Dunn (2010 NSUOCO alumnus) also planned to be part of the team but had last minute travel difficulties that would not permit her to attend.

Eye care is provided over four days (Monday through Thursday). In 2017, during the first three days, the clinic was located at a church in Coxen Hole. There, stations for specific parts of the exam were performed, and patients traveled from one station to the next until they completed a comprehensive exam. Lastly, the best-fit prescription, plano sunglasses, and necessary eye drops were dispensed to each patient. On the last day, Thursday, the team traveled to the community of Oak Ridge to care for the residents there. This community is on the other side of the island where there is less tourism and more poverty, so residents often are unable to travel to Coxen Hole for care.

Throughout the year, a variety of fundraisers are hosted to help support the upcoming trip, including fall and summer garage sales, a cornhole board raffle at the 5-State Symposium (scheduled on February 17, 2018 for this upcoming year), lapel pin sales at the White Coat Ceremony, luncheon presentations each semester, and new this year, a T-shirt sale. The McCabe endowment continues to support optometric mission trips at NSUOCO as well as other corporate contributions. Donations from various companies, family members, and friends are also accepted.

If you are interested in supporting the NSUOCO SVOSH chapter, monetary donations are greatly appreciated. They also accept donated glasses (prescription, reading, or sunglasses, as well as frames and uncut lenses), quality items for the garage sales, and optometric equipment, like tonopens, trial lens kits and much more. Most importantly, though, they ask for support of their mission.

As current NSUOCO SVOSH President, Rachel Gilliland, says, "Having people support and appreciate the work that we are doing means a lot! We love seeing all of the people that come to our fundraising events...and sharing stories and pictures from our latest trip." 



Approximately 6 states now allow several thousand optometrists to perform laser and/or surgical procedures nationally. He also travelled to Salus University in Pennsylvania along with the NSUOCO Advanced Procedures team to lecture and hold workshops over lasers, surgery, and other advanced optometric procedures. In addition, during the AOA Optometry's Meeting in Washington D.C., he met with fellow members of the AOA's Surgical Curriculum Project Team to review and present the committee's recommendations.






Dr. Alan McKee and Dr. Latricia Pack




Nathan Lighthizer O.D., F.A.A.O.





Dr. Jonathan Janzen




Dr. Andrew Young
